About the Group . . .

The RVSRG is a non-profit, fully autonomous organisation established in the late 1970's by local boat owners to promote marine safety and assist other boat owners when needed.

About 54 active volunteers — Radio Operators, Skippers and Boat Crews — conduct sea rescue/recovery missions 24 hours a day, every day of the year. They are the unsung heroes who help keep the boating community safe in local waters. During the designated rostered periods on duty, they can be called out any time day or night to undertake their duties.

Our funding is mainly resourced from annual membership fees, sponsorships, **Donations**, FESA and City of Rockingham contributions.

The group also conducts courses for National Powerboat Certificate, Recreational Skippers Ticket and Marine Radio Operators which are much needed sources of income for the group.

The Group has come a long way since it's inception when all rescues were conducted with private vessels. We now have a second dedicated 6.5 metre rescue vessel "George Grigg — Bravo 1" which assists our main 8 metre rescue vessel "Alf Powell — Alpha 1". This allows the group to institute a system of regular planned maintenance instead of a breakdown maintenance regime. This not only reduces down time, but allows the group to provide greater coverage to the boating public.

Around 200 marine rescue and boat retrieval missions are carried out annually by RVSRG.

Additionally there are regular training runs, courses and planned day and night exercises to assist active members obtain, maintain and improve their boat handling skills.
